How happy can I be happy when I only think of others? "Blessed are the merciful." Matthew 5:7



Mercy is certainly something of which we like to be on the receiving end. A police officer pulls you over. You know you rolled through that stop sign. Will he show mercy and not give you a ticket? You show up just a few minutes late for work. It doesn't matter that you think you have a

good reason—you are late. Will your boss show you mercy? You forgot your anniversary! There is no good excuse. Will your spouse show you mercy?

If I like to be on the receiving end so much, why is it that I often struggle to be merciful to others? Why do I have a hard time forgiving my loved ones when I want them to be forgiving toward me? Why is that I have such a hard time showing kindness to my coworkers or neighbors? Is it often because I feel that if I show kindness and mercy to others, it will be a sacrifice for me? Will showing mercy to others

rob me of opportunities for myself and take away my happiness?

What is mercy really all about? For the answer we need look no further than God. He shows us what real mercy is. God looked at sinful people—a people that could offer him nothing, a people helpless to help themselves—and he showed mercy. In love and mercy that astounds us, he sent his Son Jesus to be our Savior. Jesus was perfect where we could never be. Jesus paid for the sins we could never pay for. Jesus lived, died, and rose again for us so we could live forever in heaven—a gift of mercy!

The opportunities that God places before us in our lives to show mercy and kindness to other people can serve as constant reminders of the mercy that God has shown to us, a mercy we certainly didn't deserve. It is God's mercy for us that empowers us to be merciful to others and to even find happiness in showing kindness and love to other people.

Jesus said, "Blessed (happy) are the merciful." Then he goes on with a promise, "For they will be shown mercy" (Matthew 5:7). As we show mercy to others, we will also be on the receiving end of mercy!




Summer Bible Study Opportunities



Confirmation Class

We had a youth confirmation service this year on June 6 for three young Christians who have been instructed in God's Word. Before they were confirmed, though, the class wrote down their thoughts on taking the Lord's Supper. Their thoughts are printed for you below:

There are many reasons one would want to take the Lord's Supper, but three reasons are especially important to me. Confirmation class was a good place for me to learn these things.

The first reason is to follow God. Jesus told us to eat and drink, and that is what we do with the bread and wine which is his body and blood. We can't understand this, but it is the Lord's Supper.

The second is to remind us that our sins are wiped away. When we sin we feel guilty and know we deserve death and hell. But in the Lord's Supper we know we are forgiven.

Lastly, the Lord's Supper strengthens our faith. When God says you are forgiven it makes us feel relieved because we know we are going to heaven. And that strengthens our faith.

Districts discuss long-range planning

The 12 districts are all meeting in convention this month. One important item on each agenda is the Synodical Council's (SC) initial draft of the Long-Range Plan 2017. Convention delegates will be asked to discuss the plan and to forward reaction and input to the SC for consideration in a final proposal.

King David expressed complete confidence in God's care and providence when he wrote in Psalm 31, "My times are in your hands." Christians recognize that the God who knows the number of the hairs on their head is also the one who has promised to guide all things to serve their eternal good. We look to the future with confidence that

God will accomplish his will among us, and that no detail of our lives will escape his gracious and watchful eye.

As we look to the future with that kind of trust, however, it does not mean that planning for the future is somehow out of place or improper. God has also called us to be stewards and caretakers of all that he has entrusted to us. Wise planning for the future is nothing more and nothing less than wise and responsible stewardship of God's blessings.

The last synod convention recognized this truth when it called on the SC to develop a long-range plan for the mission and ministry of the synod. This plan was to describe where we, as a synod, hope to be in the year 2017. It was to establish the direction, the emphases, and the priorities of our synod for the coming years—all with the clear understanding that as we make our plans, it is God alone who will determine how those plans will be blessed.

The SC began work on the plan in the fall of 2009. A subcommittee of the SC was asked to develop a draft proposal. After some refinement and with input from the Conference of Presidents, the draft is being presented to the districts this month. Once the input of the districts is received, a final proposal will be adopted and submitted to the synod convention in 2011.

The long-range plan is not intended to be a complete and detailed description of all that the synod will do in the next six years. It is rather a broad road map of what we hope and pray to accomplish, under God, as we move forward. The long-range plan will establish general goals. It assumes, once those goals are adopted, that each area of ministry will be entrusted to develop the detailed plans and strategies to achieve those goals. It is assumed that this plan will be continually adjusted in keeping with changing circumstances. It is also intended that the plan will be extended every two years so that we are always planning the synod's work at least six years into the future.

WLS and MLC offer summer classes

Wisconsin Lutheran Seminary (WLS) and Martin Luther College (MLC) are kicking off their summer sessions. Both schools are offering courses to help pastors, teachers, and staff ministers grow spiritually and professionally.

"It's important for a called worker to move from being the feeder of the flock to the one being fed," says Rev. Richard Gurgel, director of continuing education for WLS.

One hundred eighteen students are enrolled in WLS's Summer Quarter. Most of those students will come to the seminary's Mequon, Wis., campus, June 21 through July 9. This year, though, for the first time, the seminary is also offering an online course during Summer Quarter. The course, taught by seminary professor Rev. E. Allen Sorum, has 28 students enrolled. It began on June 14 and focuses on the apostle Paul and leadership.

Sorum explains that the students he's heard from are excited to be able to work on a course on their own schedule. "At least for this summer, this is the only way they can participate in the Summer Quarter Program," he says.

Gurgel says WLS will gradually increase its online course offerings. The goal is to have three classes available for next year's Summer Quarter and to eventually offer online courses throughout the school year for those who aren't able to participate during the summer.

Martin Luther College, New Ulm, Minn., offers oncampus, off-campus, and online summer courses. Its summer session began on June 14, and 511 students are participating.

Prof. Dave Bauer, director of continuing education at MLC, says, "The called workers of WELS are well prepared to serve as pastors, teachers, and staff ministers. This educational foundation, however, is not intended in and of itself to support a lifetime of ministry. Continuing education is necessary to maintain and increase professional and spiritual qualifications for ministry excellence."
